



Hollywood Senior Center Names New Director



EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Were You Covered when the Snow Hit?

The recent snow, ice and power interruptions in our neighborhood were a good reminder that it really helps to be prepared. There are a number of resources available to help Portland residents to help themselves to prepare for the next weather emergency or any other emergency or disaster when our urban utilities don't work normally.

The Red Cross (www.oregonredcross.org) distributes an excellent booklet titled, "Together We Prepare Oregon." This booklet contains many simple steps that can save lives, including, five steps to family disaster planning, pets and disaster, building a kit, and planning for specific disasters.

An example of what should be included in a basic kit:

- Water one gallon per person per day, for drinking, cooking and sanitary needs
- Food ready to eat, non-perishable, high-protein, high-calorie foods that you enjoy (peanut butter, canned meats, energy bars, canned fruits and vegetables, etc.)
- First aid kit (see list of items on the Red Cross web site) and first aid reference guide (available from your local Red Cross)
- Portable battery-operated radio and spare batteries
- Flashlights and spare batteries
- List of emergency contacts (use worksheet on the back page of the Red Cross booklet to create a list)
- Blankets, extra clothing, sturdy shoes and gloves
- Can opener (non-electric)
- Three-day supply of critical medications, an extra pair of eyeglasses, copies of important documents (see page 6 of "Together We Prepare Oregon" for a list) and comfort items such as toys, books and games
- Food and water for pets if any
- A Together We Prepare Oregon booklet available on the Red Cross web site!
- Map of local area in case evacuation to shelters is necessary
- Crescent wrench for utility shut-off
- Duct tape and plastic sheeting or large plastic garbage bags for sheltering-in-place
- Extra cash and coins for emergency purchases and pay phones

The Project,s mission is to build audiences and develop a supportive national community of theaters committed to independent film. The Project unites the country's best independent theaters and promotes the growth and appreciation of cinema culture in local communities nationwide.

John Cooper, Director of Programming for the Sundance Film Festival said it best. "We created the Art House Project to go to the heart of where independent spirit lives all year. Each of the participating theaters is acclaimed for its innovative programming and engagement with the local arts scene. Art House Project theaters foster a cultural intersection for local and visiting filmmakers to showcase their work, for families to gather, and for daily programming to spark critical dialogue and debate.%

So what does this mean for us, the Hollywood audiences and local filmmakers?

In the spring, the Hollywood will present an exclusive series of short films from the Sundance Film Festival and will also be a participant on the Art House Project Feature tour, which features Sundance filmmakers who will present their films in person.

For local filmmakers, our association with the Festival allows us to be a direct conduit to the Sundance submission process, which also includes the waiving of entry fees.

Mr. Formal – the tuxedo shop on the corner of Sandy and 42nd has closed.




